From the President

I am pleased to report that all positions on the LVPCA Board of Directors are now filled, after functioning in lights-on-only mode for a good part of the year. Board members are volunteers, and everyone on this year's board also work full-time jobs. As a result, for example, we may not be able to hold every quarterly meeting. Our board members serve because they care about the safety and overall well-being of the community. Every member has a specific portfolio. Board members will try to respond to all messages and requests, but please bear with them and follow up if a response is delayed. A list of the current board members and contact details is later in this newsletter.

More than 80% of the LVPCA budget supports the neighborhood security patrol, which is staffed by off-duty police officers. Their presence helps assure that LaVista Park enjoys a low crime rate, which protects you, your family, and your home and maintains our property values. The patrol also provides security house checks for our members. Most recently, rates for off-duty officers have gone up considerably. To assure that we can retain our officers and recruit new ones, our patrol was given a pay increase. We will most likely need to do another increase again next year, and to support this, the board is considering membership dues increases in the 2024-2025 membership year. Our neighborhood has been fortunate to enjoy the benefits of stable membership rates for a number of years, even while other neighborhood associations were raising dues.

Our 2023 Spring Membership Campaign is behind us. Our goal was to have 327 member households for the year that started June 1, 2023. We thank everyone who renewed their membership or joined this year for the first time. We are, however, still short about 70 members. If you have delayed, please consider joining at: www.lavistapark.org/membership. In addition to membership dues, we are supported by local businesses who join as Friends of LaVista Park. This year we have ten participating businesses and have achieved our budget goal. Please see the Friends list and ads in this newsletter. When you patronize them, please let them know that you appreciate their support and show your LVCPA membership card to claim discounts or other benefits.

We were not able to hold the 2023 Fall Festival, in part because of the board vacancies earlier in the year and because of ongoing construction related to installation of new water lines by DeKalb County. We have reached out to the County to ask when construction will be complete and to note concerns over storage of construction materials in the park, but we have not had a response as of the timing of this newsletter. We are planning to have a Fall Festival in 2024, and hope to get an early start! If you are interested in volunteering, please send a note to president@lavistapark.org. We also hope to celebrate National Night out (in mid-summer 2024) and sponsor ice cream socials and monthly Happy Hour events in the coming months; other activities which we were not staffed to hold this year.

We are pleased to announce a new community Facebook group, separate from the group that the Board manages. This residents-only group can be used to connect with your neighbors, post items for sale, etc. To join, search for Lavista Park under Groups in Facebook and request to become a member. We thank our neighbors who have set up the group and volunteered to serve as administrators. They do a great job ensuring only LVP residents join.

This chart shows the breakout by crime within the area of the LaVista Park Patrol for the second quarter of the last 5 years, by quarter for 2023 and a summary for the apartment and commercial areas for these same time periods.

There were 23 total reported crimes between April and June this year, which is about average. Most of the crime – 13 of the 23 reported incidents – was in the apartments and commercial areas, including assault, auto theft and burglary from a car.

Within the residential patrol area, there were 3 instances of residential burglary, which is the highest for a single quarter since neighborhood crime tracking began.

YOUR LAVISTA PARK PATROL AT WORK

The LaVista Park Patrol is made up of off-duty DeKalb County Officers and Deputies dedicated to making LaVista Park a safer neighborhood. Sometimes in "marked cars" and sometimes in unmarked cars, the officers patrol our neighborhood during strategically selected hours each week. Their presence over the years has a direct relationship to the lower crime rates in LaVista Park compared to its DeKalb County neighbors.

While you may not see them during their rounds, the Civic Association monitors their activity while they are on duty. You can be confident that they are actively present in the neighborhood and looking out for any suspicious activity or vulnerabilities like packages left unattended. This following chart illustrates the activities engaged in by the Patrol for the second quarter of the past five years.

SUMMER TRAVEL HOUSE CHECKS

The Patrol also conducts house check services to provide peace of mind for Association members who are away from their homes for travel. This is an extraordinary benefit for our community and, again, helps support our lower crime rates.

To request a house check:

- Visit http://lavistapark.org a couple of days before your planned travel
- Click on the Membership tab located at the top of the page
- Click on the LaVista Park Patrol tab in the drop-down menu; the link to the house check form can be found highlighted in green on this page
- Print the form to fill it out and then drop it in the locked stone Patrol mailbox at the north entrance to the park on Brook Forest

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ALERTING THE AUTHORITIES

If you have neighborhood safety or security concerns, please call 911 first (call 404-843-6670 for Brookhaven) and then the Patrol at (678) 701-5223. Also, if you are using a cell phone, be sure to download the SMART 911 app and register your phone to provide key information to first responders. NOTE: The number to alert the Patrol has changed. Please update your contacts to reflect (678) 701-5223 as the number to which you can report safety or security concerns, after calling Brookhaven Police.

SAFEGUARDING YOUR HOME:

EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES TO PREVENT BURGLARIES

Home burglaries can have a devastating impact on both your property and your peace of mind. Taking proactive measures to prevent burglaries is essential for protecting your home and ensuring the safety of your family. Some preventive measures are outlined below to help you create a secure environment and significantly reduce the risk of a break-in.

Strengthen Doors and Windows

Burglars often gain entry through weak points such as doors and windows. Reinforce your entry points by installing solid core or metal doors and consider adding a deadbolt lock for an extra layer of security. Ensure that all windows have sturdy locks or install window security film to make them more difficult to break. Additionally, reinforce glass windows and doors with security film or shatter-resistant materials to make forced entry more challenging.

Install a Home Security System

Investing in a home security system is a highly effective deterrent against burglaries. Install a professionally monitored system that includes motion sensors, door/window sensors, and security cameras. Display signs indicating the presence of a security

system prominently around your property to discourage potential burglars. Additionally, consider smart home security systems that allow you to monitor and control your home remotely, providing an extra layer of convenience and peace of mind.

Illuminate Your Property

Well-lit exteriors make burglars think twice about targeting your home. Install outdoor lighting around entry points, walkways, and the perimeter of your property. Motion-activated lights are especially effective in catching trespassers off guard. Consider using timers or smart lighting systems to ensure that your home appears occupied even when you're away. Illuminating your property not only deters burglars but also improves visibility for your neighbors and passing authorities.

Maintain Landscaping for Visibility

Overgrown shrubs and trees provide cover for burglars to operate undetected. Regularly trim vegetation near windows and entry points to eliminate hiding spots. Consider planting thorny bushes near vulnerable areas to create a natural deterrent. Additionally, maintain clear sightlines around your property by removing tall obstructions that could block the view from the street or neighboring homes. Increased visibility makes it harder for burglars to approach your property unnoticed.


Secure Access Points

Burglars often exploit vulnerabilities in access points such as garage doors and sliding glass doors. Reinforce your garage door with a sturdy lock or install a garage door security system. Use a rod or track lock on sliding glass doors to prevent them from being forced open. Consider installing window security film or adding security bars to basement or ground-level windows. Secure all potential entry points to make it significantly more challenging for burglars to gain access to your home.

Preventing home burglaries requires a proactive approach and attention to security measures. Remember, investing in prevention is key to protecting your home and providing peace of mind.

DeKalb passes non-discrimination ordinance

The DeKalb County Board of Commissioners unanimously passed a non-discrimination ordinance at its recent July meeting. DeKalb County Presiding Officer and District 1 Commissioner Robert Patrick and Commissioner Lorraine Cochran-Johnson introduced the measure.

After the vote, the commissioners raised a Pride flag outside the Manuel J. Maloof Government Center with DeKalb County CEO Michael Thurmond and other local leaders, including: State Rep. Karla Drenner, the first opening gay state representative; Doraville City Councilmember Stephe Koontz, a transgendered leader; former Atlanta City Council President Cathy Woolard; Jeff Graham of Georgia Equality; and former State Rep. Matthew Wilson who's also current First Vice Chair of the Democratic Party of Georgia.

The ordinance bars businesses from discriminating against any person on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, pregnancy, age, disability, genetic information, familial status, marital status, political affiliation, political opinion, sexual orientation, parental status, gender identity, or protective hairstyle in places of public accommodation is contrary to the public welfare, health, safety, and morals of the county.

Patrick praised the board for passage of the ordinance. "I'm very proud of the colleagues that I serve with. The ordinance talks about classes and groups of people, but those are family members, those are friends, those are our brothers and sisters. They're our people. More often than not, when America comes together and starts talking about how we work together to get things done, we're a better country and we do some amazing things together," Commissioner Patrick said.

"I wish we could say this vote takes care of it," he said, but added the increasingly "unfriendly environment" makes that unlikely. "We just want to treat people fairly."

The ordinance establishes that any business that is a place of public accommodation, or any owner, operator, lessee, manager, agent or employee of such business, may not refuse, deny or make a distinction, directly or indirectly, in offering its goods, services, facilities, and accommodations, to any person because of that person's protected characteristics.

Brookhaven Park

Brookhaven Park is located at 4851 Peachtree Road in Brookhaven. The City of Brookhaven acquired the park from Dekalb County in April 2022. Improvements by the City have been ongoing since.

On July 24th the City held a groundbreaking ceremony held to kick off the current round of new improvements. Those improvements include: a larger parking lot, a new building with restrooms at the dog park, a pavilion, and a deck with grills.

The city will also improve the sidewalks and the garden club area of the park. A new and larger playground will replace the current smaller playground. The new playground area will also have restrooms and a small pavilion.



Millage Rate

The Brookhaven City Council has voted to maintain the current millage rates for property taxes for the City.

At the public hearing Brookhaven determined millage, taxes paid by property and businesses owners. Some residents asked for the city to "lower the millage rate while property values are increasing significantly." The council voted unanimously to approve a resolution maintaining last year's millage rate, the lowest in DeKalb County.

Since 2015, Brookhaven's millage rate has been 2.74 and will produce \$12.6 million in revenue.

The LaVista Park special district funds the City's most recent annexation. The millage rate is being set at 1.6 mills for the last year of its repayment of the loan to the City's general fund. Upon repayment of the loan, which funded improvements solely to LaVista Park, the special tax district will be dissolved and LaVista park's millage will decrease.

Trees, Debris cleaned up

Tyler Lenn, the assistant arborist, and his colleagues at the City of Brookhaven dealt with two longstanding issues during March. They arranged for a contractor to remove two large dead trees, including one near weir in the lower corner that was the subject of many

complaints. They also removed a number of smaller dead trees that had been girdled by the goats along the path. It's been a long process, but we now have a more attractive and much safer park.

YOUR VOICE MATTERS: Brookhaven election & governance

Mark your calendar: The election for Brookhaven Mayor and for City Council seats for District 1 (currently represented by Linley Jones) & District 3 (currently represented by Madeleine Simmons) is Tues., Nov. 7, 2023. Also, concurrent with this election will be a special election to select a new representative for the unexpired term of City Council District 2; John Park resigned that seat recently to run for Mayor.

In addition to John Park, three others have qualified to run for Mayor: Mark Douglas Frost (no website found as of press time), Hilerie Lind and Lauren Kiefer. Current Mayor John Ernst is term-limited, having served two terms and is thus not standing for re-election.

The last day to register to vote in this election is Mon., Oct. 10. To register to vote in Georgia or verify your voter registration (always a good idea!), <u>visit here</u>. Learn more about <u>Brookhaven government</u>, including important boards & commissions on which citizens can serve.

LaVista Park falls within Brookhaven City Council District 4, represented by John Funny, whose four-year term is not up for re-election until 2025.

It's important to note that Brookhaven, which became a city in 2012, is a City Manager form of government. That means we elect a Mayor and Council representatives, but a professional manager handles day-to-day operations of the City. The City Manager is appointed by the Mayor, confirmed by City Council and, for instance, prepares the budget and oversees hiring. Brookhaven City Manager Christian Sigman has been in his role since May 2016.

Arborist Update

City of Brookhaven Arborist Tyler Lenn spoke at the July 20 quarterly meeting of the LVPCA. Tyler has overseen recent work in the park, including removal of dead trees and control of invasive species. Tyler told us that the park has a number of large, "specimen" trees, which appear to be in very good health. The stream is also in relatively good condition, with plant cover holding erosion in check. Tyler asked that people check with his office before planting anything in the forested portion of the park, as the city would like to maintain it as close as possible to its natural state.

Tyler reminded homeowners that the City of Brookhaven requires a permit to remove any tree more than 4 inches in diameter from your property, whether dead or alive. ARTIIITRPRMAMA . Permits are free to homeowners, and the city arborist is available to answer questions (404-637-0749). Homeowners should be aware that there can be substantial fines tree removal without a permit, and the city has recently stepped up enforcement. Be sure to obtain a permit before removing any trees from your property!

In particular, Nandina domestica (Heavenly or Sacred Bamboo) is a concern because its brightly colored, but cyanide-containing fruits are poisonous to wildlife (more information available from the Clemson Cooperative Extension Service, https://hgic.clemson.edu).

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
